

# Ways you can TAKE ACTION to better prepare for fire!

- 1. Sign up!
  - a. <u>www.deschutesalerts.org</u> to receive emergency alerts via phone, text, email, and more for locations you care about.
  - b. www.centraloregonfire.org to receive prescribed burn & wildfire alerts
  - c. www.watchduty.org to stay up-to-date on local fire information.
- 2. **Bookmark** deschutes.org/emergency to monitor incidents and find evacuation routes.
- 3. **Understand evacuation levels and GO EARLY**, whenever possible. During evacuation, roads become congested with dust and smoke, making travel slow.
  - a. Level 1 READY: There's an emergency nearby. Prepare to evacuate!
  - b. Level 2 SET: Danger is significant. Be set to go at a moment's notice!
  - c. Level 3 GO: Your life is threatened. Evacuate immediately!



- 4. **Say hello!** Knowing your neighbors has been shown to significantly improve emergency preparedness, resilience, response, and recovery.
- 5. Create a customized emergency plan for your family and home. Include emergency contacts, evacuation plans, designated meeting places, a communications plan, family roles and responsibilities, and special accommodations for kids, pets, etc.
- 6. **Pack a "Go Bag"**. Assemble essential supplies, gear, documents, and keepsakes in advance that you can easily grab in the event of an evacuation.
- 7. Request a FREE wildfire home assessment with Bend Fire or Summit West Neighborhood District. Volunteers will visit your home and suggest ways you can make your property more wildfire resilient.
- 8. Harden your home and create sufficient defensible space around your home this spring. Clean out your gutters and install ember-resistant 1/8" metal wire mesh, such as Kwikmesh<sup>TM</sup>, on your vents.
- Talk with your neighbors and HOA Board and/or ARC Committee, if applicable. Encourage them to: a) become a Firewise Community, and b) align their CC&Rs and policies with home hardening and defensible space best practices.





# **Wildfire Preparedness Resources**



### Ways you can TAKE ACTION to better prepare for insurance risks!

- 1. Talk with your insurance agent. Make sure you understand your coverage levels, discuss potential gaps, and make changes as needed to ensure appropriate coverage types and limits. If your rates have increased, ask if there are actions you can take to make it less expensive. If you're not being renewed, ask for specific reasons why. - 2. **Build a home inventory**. Create a visual and/or written record of your possessions to assess if you have enough coverage and help maximize claim payments after an incident. Visit https://dfr.oregon.gov/insure/home/Pages/home-inventory.aspx.
- 3. **Build a financial first aid kit.** Gather and securely store copies of financial and identifying records. Set aside cash for emergencies.
- 4. **Know what to do** *after* **a disaster strikes.** Check out NAIC's <u>Post-Disaster Claims Guide</u> for tips on what you should do to report a claim, estimate damage, maximize your benefits, and more.
